President's Message

Another kitten season at RESQCATS has come to an end. We have placed 131 stray and abandoned cats and kittens into perfect homes in 2006! That brings our total number of adoptions in nine years to 1090! WOW! We celebrated our 1000th adoption in July! How did 90 more kitties already come and go? What a whirlwind.

When I take a moment to breathe and think back over this past year, I remember a lot of wonderful kitties and some very special people who have stepped through our doors. The kitties all have their own stories; some stories we love, but many have histories we don't know. Some stories I do not want to know because I can only imagine their suffering before arriving at RESQCATS.

There are also some exceptional people that have been a part of our journey this year and have left guite an impression on my heart. There have been people who found pregnant cats on the streets and cared enough to take the time to get them to RESQCATS where they could deliver their kittens in a safe and healthy environment. "Pumpkin" gave birth to five kittens on August 24, 2006 and I was right by her side to watch and assist if she needed help. It was a wonderful experience! Some found a very young mommy cat, who weighed only five and a half pounds, nursing eight kittens behind an apartment building. Many, if not all of her kittens would have died if left out on the streets. "Twiggy" and her eight babies survived because someone cared enough to get them to RESQCATS. One lady and her daughter found four tiny kittens in their backyard with no mom in sight. A caring young man found a single kitten "thrown away" in a dumpster at his work place. Other people alerted me to kitties living in horrible conditions that desperately needed help. All of these people cared enough to do their own "rescue" and bring them to RESQCATS.

I cannot say enough about the special people that volunteer and foster kittens for RESQCATS. They give so much of their valuable time to help out, not to mention what it takes emotionally to work at RESQCATS. They are the core of our organization and words cannot express my gratitude for all they do.

And then there are those special people who decide to adopt a rescued cat or kitten. They make a conscious decision to not "buy" a kitten. In addition they are not supporting the indiscriminate breeding of cats by breeders!

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An Angel Among Us

Cats with special needs require angels and Elizabeth Zeller is one of them.

he challenges we face at **RESOCATS** with the arrival of each new litter vary; and obviously some are easier to tackle than others. Kittens with goopy, runny eyes can be medicated. A healthy diet change and de-worming can take care of diarrhea and a flea bath can get rid of nasty bugs and street dirt. Even the sick cats and kitten begin their road to recovery with a trip to the vet and the proper medical care. Of course, I worry about all of them...it just comes with the territory.

Our biggest challenge, however, is working with the feral kittens. As you know, RESQCATS works with an organization called Catalyst for Cats. Their mission is to trap the ferals, have them spayed or neutered and then return them to their location where someone is responsible for feeding them. The process is called "Trap-Neuter-Return," or TNR. We take in a lot of the

them accustomed to the human touch and socialize them so that they can find purrfect homes. I more than worry about some of these kittens.

Recently, Catalyst for Cats dropped off a litter of four feral kittens. When I saw them, my heart just sank. Three of them were black and most people will not adopt black cats(I have yet to figure out why). October was quickly approaching and it is not a good idea to adopt out black cats during that month. Halloween is a time when many cults and sick people sacrifice black cats. (Believe me, I get a call or two every year at this time!) The other kitten was a beautiful Siamese mix with luminous blue eyes, but she also had quite an attitude! All four had been in a foster home prior to their arrival and received some socialization. In fact, the three black kittens were quite the purring machines within a few short days. The Siamese, however, had been trapped about a week after her siblings and she was way behind her sisters and brothers when it came to socialization. She hissed, spit, frowned and feared anyone approaching her. At that time I knew that only her beauty would entice someone to adopt her. But her beauty would only take her so far...she needed a lot of socializing! Since she was particularly attached to her brother we eventually put just the two of them, "Lila" and "Huckleberry," together in an enclosure. It was decided that these two should be adopted together.

It took weeks for Lila to begin to blossom. Every volunteer was required to spend time with Lila. They spent hours socializing her and we hoped some of Huckleberry's playful disposition would be contagious. We finally discovered Lila's two weak points where we could begin socialization: every kitten has at least one thing that will help us start the process to bring them out of their shell. Lila loved to be fed baby food off our fingers and to receive foot massages (these sent her into a purring mode)! Lila remained timid even though she progressed each week.

I knew that Lila, like other feral kittens, needed a special home with someone who understood that their job would be to continue our socialization process when the kitty arrived at their new home. It is a task that requires incredible understanding, patience, persistence and unconditional love. When interviewing perspective guardians for the "Lila's of the world," I paint a picture just the way it is, I don't "pull any punches." It is my job to inform people of the kitty's history and what it will take to continue to help them blossom and become lovable cats.

I cannot help but imagine what the adoptive guardian will be like...compassionate, understanding and willing to commit a lot of time and love. Somehow when I think of all those attributes I get an image in my mind of what the person will look like...agile and able to climb under things to get kittens out of hiding and tough skinned to tolerate being scratched and hissed at. WELL, Lila and Huckleberry's person arrived in a very different package!

We featured the pair of kittens in the local newspaper in the "Pet of the Week" section. I received several phone calls, but most people wanted to adopt Lila and not her black brother. It was her beauty that stimulated the calls. People listened to me as I explained Lila's background and what she needed in her new home...many seemed willing to meet her, but did not want to even consider Huckleberry. Two days of answering phone calls and inquiries ended in disappointment and I was pretty discouraged.

Then, Elizabeth Zelle called and said she had seen the picture in the paper and knew that Lila and Huckleberry were meant for her. She sounded wonderful

during our telephone interview, passed all the requirements... indoors, no declawing, etc....so we set up an appointment time for her to meet them.

When Elizabeth arrived at the door of the RESQCATS cattery... every image I had manufactured in my head of the purrfect guardian for the two kittens went right out the back door! She was a little lady who could not have been five feet tall, petite in everyway and I didn't dare guess her age....let's just say that she is a mature retired woman! She wore a beautiful purple jacket with pants to match, an exquisite white crocheted hat with a brim and a beautiful antique watch pin on her lapel. She was lovely and had a lot of class! I stopped in my tracks when I saw her and I politely introduced myself. It took all my imagination to picture her as the right person for Lila. Would she be able to climb under the bed and couches to get Lila when she hid? Were kittens okay for her at her seemingly mature age? I just didn't know.

Elizabeth entered the enclosure with BJ, one of our long time volunteers, who had spent the most time with Lila. Her eyes instantly lit up and she smiled a great big smile. BJ spent over half an hour sharing Lila's weak points with Elizabeth...giving her baby food to feed Lila from her fingers and showing her how to do those foot massages. They played with her favorite feather toy and Lila responded to everything.

I, however, kept encouraging Elizabeth to look at some of the other more social kitties...especially a sweet mommy cat that would dearly love a lap to curl up on and desperately needed a home. Elizabeth would have nothing to do with it and couldn't take her eyes off Lila and Huckleberry. She truly radiated an energy that Lila received. Perhaps Elizabeth's spunk and sense of humor would be what it took to make this kitten happy.

After numerous attempts of encouraging her to look at some of the others...all of which obviously failed...Elizabeth said, "Where do I sign up?!" I should have known then that she was the right fit for continues on page 3

Some Special Recognition

Seven people whom I consider to be "angels" walked through the doors of RESOCATS in 2006 and recognized the beauty in adopting an adult cat. This exceptional group of people touch all our hearts. I feel especially grateful to them and would like to thank each one of them.

There is always panic when we receive an adult cat at RESQCATS. I begin to worry immediately about finding homes for adult kitties during the height of kitten season. Then I brace myself for everyone's excuses for not adopting one.

My experience over the last nine years has been that 99% of people will adopt a kitten before they will consider even a teenage kitten or young adult. As a matter of fact, shy, timid, hissing, hiding kittens get adopted purely because of their size long before the sweet loving moms that just want to sit in your lap find homes.

Recently, a darling black and white mommy cat named "Twiggy" and her EIGHT two-week-old kittens arrived at RESQCATS after being found behind an apartment building in Lompoc. Upon showing this beautiful family to people wanting to adopt I was saddened once again to observe the number of people who never even noticed the proud mom...they only saw her kittens. It is a story that is repeated over and over every single year. It is a very frustrating and often disappointing part of my job.

Out of the 130 kitties that passed through RESQCATS' doors this year, seven were adults. Many days I just ended my day in tears wondering if I would be left with another adult resident since no one saw the beauty in them because they were "grown." In reality, six of the seven were moms under a year old—still kittens themselves—who played with their own babies in between caring and nursing them.

These "angels" are the exception to the norm, falling into that small category of those who adopted an adult (or nearly adult) cat. Some of these young mommy cats even got to go home with one (or two) of their kittens!

Jim and Jenny McKenna...

our long-time friends, gave "Tibby" a home after she had been attacked by two dogs and her owner could not pay for surgery. Jenny says it is "a match made in Heaven!"

Stephanie Rounce...

took "Nemris" and her only surviving kitten "Miracle" home together. Nemris, pregnant, was found with several other kitties that were inside a cardboard box, duct-taped closed, in the middle of the street.

When Katie and Ace were broadcast on television in search of a home...30 calls were received about her kittens. Only one, from Shelley and Tim, was about giving Katie and her kitten a home!

Patti Laut and Mark Smith...

gave "OJEE" (aka "Woof") the home he deserved after being abandoned and forced to live on the streets for who knows how long. He was shy at first but has made himself right at home.

Carole Wasserman...

"Slinky" has it made with Carole. This poor mommy cat and her three kittens were found living inside a cat carrier in their own feces and urine, without water and eating chicken McNuggets!

The "POLAR BEAR FUND"

Created to take care of the special-needs kitties.

Many of you are aware to the fact that every kitty that passes through RESQCATS follows a particular medical protocol—this includes a vet exam, testing for Feline Leukemia and/or FIV, worming medication, and a Distemper vaccination, plus all are spayed or neutered before going to a new home. All the cats and kittens from the 2006 season are home with their new guardians; however, some remain under RESQCATS care for medical challenges that have appeared after their arrival home.

For example; the new guardians for "Sayge" noticed blood in her urine about two weeks after adopting her and her sister "Rayven." Deborah and her husband have been wonderful about getting Sayge to her doctor's appointments for blood work, urinalysis, x-rays and most recently, an ultrasound. Sayge, who is about four months old, has no idea that anything is wrong...she

romps and plays like a normal kitten and gets into all sorts of kitten antics with Rayven. Her ultrasound, however, reveals a birth anomaly that can be corrected with surgery if the anti-inflammatory medication she is taking does not help.

The philosophy at RESQCATS is to take care of these expenses until doctors have released her as a perfectly healthy kitten. We would cover those costs if she was still at RESQCATS and her condition had been discovered while she was here. The difference is that no one would want to adopt her until it was resolved.



So far, Sayge's expenses are over \$1000 and if surgery is required they will be even higher.

The POLAR BEAR FUND was created to take care of the special-needs kitties. The fund was named after a special-needs cat named "Polar Bear" who was adopted several years ago by Dick Haines and his daughters, Paula and Melodie. Polar Bear had a lot of medical expenses during his lifetime due to his life on the streets before RESQCATS. His "angels" took care of everything he needed until his last breath. When Polar Bear died, we wanted to remember and honor him forever by starting this fund to help other kitties like him. The Polar Bear Fund is the kind of fund you hope you never need to use because it means that there are extraordinary medical circumstances that require above-the-normal protocols and attention.

I am grateful for a lot of things, but two are especially important when it comes to Sayge. First, she has wonderful guardians that love her and are willing to ride the roller coaster of emotional ups and downs during this time of diagnosing Sayge's condition and determining the treatment to correct it. Many people would have just said, "I don't want the cat so I am bringing her back." And secondly, I am grateful for all of you who donate to RESQCATS and designate your donation to the Polar Bear Fund. You are why RESQCATS can do what we do for all the special needs kitties.

"Sayge" and I thank you from the bottom of our hearts!



A Tail of Two Kitties

So often, when you are involved in animal rescue work, it is impossible to go anywhere without noticing the sad plight of animals everywhere. I find myself searching for kittens when I see a stray cat that is obviously nursing babies somewhere in some bushes or god-forsaken place. It may be a lost dog or hurt bird that captures my attention. I spent the whole day with my friend during a cruise in Kusadasi, Turkey buying roasted chickens from the street vendors to feed all the stray dogs. I once applied flea treatment to some poor flea-infested kitty in Rome with the help of an English woman who had Advantage in her purse! She was from London and shared that she carries it with her on all her vacations. Many times, I have asked my husband to go into a local deli in the Caribbean to buy a sandwich for a dog. I always stop in Gold's Beach, Oregon on vacation trips to feed and donate to the jetty kitties. It never ends but it helps me realize that the strays that are in shelters waiting for homes are fortunate compared to the others.

I was glad to know that I am not the only one out there who spends time worrying about those same things. I think you will enjoy the following story by Karen Lee Stevens.

So there I was standing in the gorgeous gardens at the EI Encanto Hotel on a recent Sunday afternoon. I had been invited to an intimate gathering of local singer/songwriters, including Barry DeVorzon and Kenny Loggins, who had generously given their time to perform a concert to benefit the Unity Shoppe. As I dipped my hand into a tray of decadent desserts and sipped iced-tea, all I could think of was: What about the hotel's two cats?

If you have ever visited the El Encanto Hotel, chances are good that you've bumped into

one or both of the hotel's furry felines—Simba (14) and Gherkin (13)—the resident "House Cats," according to their business cards. I learned that the nearly 100-year-old hotel was scheduled

to close the next day for major renovations and I fretted about the fate of the two tabbies. I wasn't alone. When I questioned Clive O'Donoghue, the hotel's general manager, he smiled and told me that several guests had asked about them. He also disclosed a little about their history: the mother and son had simply showed up one day more than a decade ago, both sporting "ear tips."

Ahh, hearing about the ear tips is what, well, tipped me off that Simba and Gherkin had once been wild before they were trapped, spayed and neutered, and released back into a colony of cats to live out their natural lives—without reproducing. Dozens of organizations across the country "ear tip" feral felines as part of a humane program called Trap-Neuter-Release (TNR). TNR has proven to be an effective way to humanely deal with the feline over-population problem by spaying and neutering feral and abandoned cats and socializing and finding homes for rescued kittens.

Santa Barbara is fortunate to have such an organization and it's called Catalyst for Cats (CFC). For 16 years, Randi Fairbrother, CFC's founder, and a team of dedicated volunteers, have rescued thousands of feral and abandoned cats and kittens, who would otherwise have lived short, miserable lives on the streets.

I often contemplate the grim fate of the homeless cats struggling for survival, especially the moms with newborn kittens. I can't begin to fathom the desperation they surely feel on a daily basis. After all, they must keep their kittens—and themselves—warm, well-fed, and out of danger. From time to time, I foster feral kittens for Catalyst for Cats as well as the Animal Shelter Assistance Program (ASAP) and find it a hugely rewarding experience. It can be for you too. As for Simba and Gherkin? O'Donoghue assured me that the pair will continue to live on the grounds of the El Encanto Hotel while the renovations take place.

"They're old now," he professes. "But we hope they'll be with us for a few more years."

How To Enter The Photo Contest!



If you pay attention and learn well, when the journey is done, you will be not just a better person, but the person your companion animal always knew you to be.

The one they were proud to call beloved friend. I must caution you that this journey is not without pain. Like all paths of true, the pain is the part of loving. For as surely as the sun sets, one day your dear animal companion will follow a trail you cannot yet go down. And you will have to find the strength and love to let them go.

An animal companions time earth is far too short, especially for those that love them. We borrow them, really, just for a while, and during these brief years they are generous enough to give us all their love, every inch of their spirit and heart, until one day there is nothing left. The cat that only yesterday was a kitten is all too soon old and frail and sleeping in the sun. The young pup of boundless energy now wakes up stiff and lame, the muzzle gone to gray.

Deep down we somehow always knew that this journey would end. We knew that if we gave our hearts they would be broken. But give them we must for it is all they ask in return. 
