President's Message

Even though writing each newsletter takes a tremendous amount of time...I realize how important it is to keep all of you informed. As contributors, you are what makes this organization possible and I do love writing and keeping you up to date.

Since **RESQCATS** began our 11th season in April we have adopted 113 cats and kittens out into the community. An additional 8 are ready to go out the door when their purrfect person comes along. Four more kittens will arrive as soon as as space is available and a nursing mom and several more litters are in foster care! It's no wonder I have no time to breathe!

I want to give special credit in this newsletter to the volunteers. Their gift of time is a priceless treasure! They work hours cleaning enclosures, socializing cats and kittens, fostering, running errands for supplies, taking kitties to the vets and other endless chores. **RESQCATS** core volunteers are here all year to help with the daily routine. And we have been lucky to have several young volunteers join us for the summer to help out and earn community service hours for school. Like you, they play an integral part in the success of **RESQCATS**.

The 2008 kitten season has been one of the busiest in our history. I just cannot believe that with all the spay and neuter surgeries that all the rescue organizations are doing prior to adoptions now that there are still so many cats and kittens!

In addition to taking in stray and abandoned cats and kittens, **RESQCATS** has reached out to several individuals with mother cats and their kittens by offering to pay to have the moms spayed in return for relinquishing the kittens to us. If the kittens are just given away by the owners of the mother cat, there is no guarantee that those kittens will not be having their own litters in Spring 2009! **RESQCATS** will have the kittens spayed and neutered before finding homes for them. It is just one way we can help stop the pet over-population explosion!

RESQCATS has also approached a local pet store about spaying and neutering all their kittens before selling them. Unfortunately, we have not been successful in that attempt. (see "8 reasons Not to Buy a Kitten from a Pet Store")

The News-Press Holiday Fund has been a blessing to **RESQCATS** this year. Our expenses have increased dramatically – vaccines are up in cost, the price of litter has gone up 25%, food costs have soared and there just seems to be no end in sight to the increases. In addition, **RESQCATS** was able to "clean-up" an

How We Get Cats!

So often, I am asked, "Where do you get the cats at RESQCATS?" Well, they all have a story!

I do not always know the complete history for each of our kitties. I do know their life changes for the better once they arrive at **RESQCATS**. And they all have a happy ending once we find the purfect home for them.

Some of the cats and kittens are in good shape and spirits when they arrive, but that is usually because they have been fostered by a volunteer before they arrive at **RESQCATS**. Some are not so lucky and it takes a lot of work to get them healthy and happy. I am grateful that I do not always know their circumstances...it would be too difficult to think about.

Here is the history of a few of the 2008 arrivals to RESQCATS:

- Several pregnant moms, un-neutered males, young mother cats and all their kittens were relinquished to **RESQCATS** by a hoarder. They were all living in a condo that had not been cleaned in two years! The adults had never seen another human being except for the young woman who had them. Seventeen kittens were also rescued from her. Some of the adults died and many of the kittens died due to the conditions they were living in despite all our efforts to save them. The ones that made it....are our "miracles."
- "Harry" & "Hermione" were found as tiny little kittens outside a storage unit in Goleta.

- "Mia" (aka "Amore"), who was only seven pounds, was left at the Santa Maria Humane Society. She was attempting to nurse two different newborn litters...a total of NINE kittens.
- "Amy" was found underneath a house with seven other kittens and three nursing moms!
- "Missy," right, was heard crying and found by a Santa Barbara couple, all by herself, in the bushes of their backyard.

Missy was adopted by **Peter Sproul**, along with a playmate for her, *Buddy*.



 Before "Toby's" guardian died she asked a vet technician at Adobe Pet Hospital to take Toby to RESQCATS to find him a new home.



Toby was adopted by **Kathy Bresslin**.

• A litter of five kittens were found in the garbage can in Carpinteria.



"Kachina" and four siblings were born in a garage to a feral mom. The mother cat moved to a home that would offer her food and the owners did not want any of the kittens!

- "Lila" and her three siblings were left behind as kittens to survive on the streets of Santa Maria when their people moved!
- "Baby" and her four kittens were found by Ross Fisher, a RESQCATS volunteer, while making a service call for cable TV. The mom and the ten-weekold kittens were running around outside. The woman had no intention of spaying the mother cat or the kittens due to finances....but she could afford cable TV!



Baby was returned to her owner after she was spayed. The kittens were relinquished to RESQCATS.

These account for only a small number of cats and kittens out there that need help...they are some of the lucky ones. They have each, in their own special way, brought joy to all of us while residing at **RESQCATS** and will hopefully bring joy, laughter and most important of all...unconditional love to the wonderful people who have adopted them from **RESQCATS** this year! \blacklozenge

The RESOCATS Volunteers

Every non-profit organization depends on volunteers...they are the core of **RESQCATS**...they are what makes everything possible on a daily basis.

Each volunteer at RESQCATS has something to offer in his or her own way.

I have truly come to appreciate the volunteers and their dedication, commitment and compassion for all the cats and kittens that come through our doors in search of something better than the life they have previously experienced. I am amazed at how hard the volunteers work, especially during kitten season when it is so important to follow schedules in order to get everything done.

It doesn't matter whether a volunteer is responsible for cleaning enclosures, changing litter boxes, bathing flea-ridden kittens, fostering, socializing scared kittens or posting ads on Craig's List and Petfinder...it is all equally important in my eyes. It takes all of those tasks to make RESQCATS work well.

For the last few years, RESQCATS has had a Volunteer Appreciation Day when all the volunteers are invited to my home for fun, food and...well, to just be appreciated. I usually do the cooking (many of you are aware that I don't cook often so it is pretty risky for the volunteers to consider eating while they are here!) and we spend the afternoon getting to know each other in a non-working atmosphere, passing out new tee-shirts, RESQCATS cards and our "Believe in Miracles" candle. 

unhealthy hoarding situation that had become completely out of control. It has taken us over four months to deal with all the cats and kittens that were relinquished. Their medical bills and other costs for their care approaches \$5000.00! It would have been impossible for **RESQCATS** to help if not for you as contributors and the Holiday Fund.

RESQCATS has continued to have all the cats and kittens follow a medical procedure, regardless of the rising costs. Each receives a vet exam, is tested for Feline Leukemia/FIV, is wormed and vaccinated and, of course, is spayed or neutered before going to a new home. Our adoption donation has remained the same \$85 it has been for several years so that we may stay competitive with other adoption organizations. But that difference has to be made up somewhere!

I am hoping you will help make up that difference...and make a difference by doing so with your tax-deductible donation. I know times are tough for all of us and that everyone is very conscious of every dollar, but I hope that **RESQCATS** will continue to be an organization that you support even during these times. We do still need your help.

Our Indoors-Only Policy / Reasons to Keep Cats Indoors

Many of you know that RESQCATS has an indoor-only policy for cats. This means indoors-only 100% of the time for the cat's entire lifetime.

Not everyone understands or agrees with the policy but differences in ideas are what makes the diverse world "go 'round" so to speak. I make no exceptions to this rule and people usually understand once I explain the reasons why to keep a cat inside. I always share with the potential adopter that I respect their philosophy of wanting a cat to go out. I explain that they need to do what works for them and their lifestyle and share the names of other organizations that may fit their desire for an indoor/outdoor or outdoor cat. The conversation usually ends on a good note...the person knows the names of other organizations without the indoor only rule and I always wish them luck and invite them to call me if they have any questions about anything even if they adopt from another organization.

Sometimes, however, the call does not go so well and the person on the other end of the phone gets mad at me for my beliefs. I recently had such an encounter with a lady who wanted to adopt a kitten for her 11-year-old daughter. She had e-mailed me about a kitten she saw on the web site. I answered her with a phone call. It was apparent during the phone interview process that she did not believe in indoor-only cats. I literally felt attacked through the phone line by her, but I kept my cool as I explained why **RESOCATS** had adopted the policy. I gave her examples of the calls I had received over the years from people who had adopted from **RESQCATS** prior to our "indoor-only" rule. Such calls included kittens at a year old that were hit in front of their house; a cat that dragged itself home without the use of his back legs because it was hit or mauled by a coyote; or cats that never returned home at night. I told her that I personally found an adult cat that I had adopted out to a young lady who had been hit and was laying on the side of the road on Las Positas which is a road that I must travel everyday when I leave my house to do anything. I shared this with the lady in a heartfelt and professional manner. I also told her that I respected her philosophy and understood it because my cats used to go outside. When one of them was hit and killed by a car, they all came back inside to safety. She escalated in her anger and abruptly responded, "Well, if you are going to require that, you should post it on your web site!"

I shared with her that I wanted an honest answer from people and that is why it was not on the web site. Then I thanked her for her honesty. She abruptly said, "yeah, yeah, bye" and hung up!

I felt awful....I had been as professional and polite as I could possibly be. I checked the web site and sure enough it did state our policy. So I decided to write her and share that our policy was actually on the web site and told her where to find it. I wrote that I was sorry that she was so upset with me and our policy but it was differences in ideas in this world that made it so diverse and (as I always say) "go 'round."

Her reply came the next day. She blamed me for making her daughter so unhappy when I would not allow them to adopt just because I was so worried about cars and coyotes when they could provide a safe and loving home. She said I was "**ridiculous**" and signed off by writing... "Well, its your loss!"

I wrote back one more time and told her that I was actually preventing **HER** loss! I wished her the very best of luck in finding a kitten for her family and shared that I never doubted for a minute that they would love the cat. I signed "Sincerely, Jeffyne." Following are some good reasons for cats to be indoors...

"In 1992, the Humane Society of the US approximated the average life span of an outdoor cat as 4 years while indoor cats often reached 14-17 years, or even older"

- Your cat won't get hit by a car.
- Your cat won't get lost.
- Your cat won't be frightened by loud blasts of traffic, gardeners working or construction
- noise.
- It won't be attacked by another animal such as a coyote, dog or cat
- It won't be hurt by the whims of a neighbor that may not like cats and try to harm it.



- Your cat is less likely to be infested with fleas, ticks and worms.
- Your cat won't catch diseases from other animals such as feline leukemia, FIV, rabies or immunodeficiency viruses.
- Your cat is less likely to ingest a deadly poison such as antifreeze or pesticide.
 Your cat won't ingest plants that may be toxic to them.
 Your cat won't be stolen.

Your cat won't wind up at the pound if it becomes lost.

• Your cat won't become ill ingesting garbage or contaminated food left outside.



- Your cat won't become trapped in a place from which it cannot escape, such as a neighbor's garage.
- Your cat won't be exposed to the weather elements such as freezing in the winter or becoming dehydrated in the hot summer.

Your cat won't eat wildlife such as birds.

Doesn't seem "ridiculous" to me! ◆



The 9 Most Common Tail Positions and What They Mean

(from Planet Cat by Sandra Choron, Harry Choron and Arden Moore)

1. Hoisted high. A confident, contented cat holds its tail high in the air. A totally erect tail signals a happy mood or a friendly greeting and cats often send this message as they approach a welcoming person. If the top third of the tail twitches as the cat nears you, this means that he totally adores you!





2. Question mark. Get out the toys! A tail bent in the question mark position is a sign that the cat is in a playful mood.

3. Flying low. If the tail is positioned straight down and parallel to his legs, the cat may be in an aggressive mood. Be wary!





4. Tucked away. A tail that is tucked beneath the body means fear or submission and that something is making him nervous.

5. Twitching. Tails that twitch just at the tip indicate curiosity and excitement!



6. **Puffed up.** A cat with a puffed up tail is severely agitated and/or frightened. He is trying to look bigger in order to ward off danger.





7. Whipping. Stay away! A tail that is whipping back and forth signals both fear and aggression.

8. Swishing. A swishing tail signals a predatory mood. The cat is usually focused on a particular object....for example, a cat's tail swishes just before he pounces on a toy.

7 Reasons Not to Buy a Kitten from a Pet Store

– from Planet Cat by Sandra Choron, Harry Choron, and Arden Moore

Pet store kittens come from kitten mills, and kitten mills are nothing but cruel, inhumane breeding factories. These felines deserve our compassion...but buying kittens from a pet store simply allows kitten mills to stay in existence and churn out hundreds of thousands of kittens each year and that add to the number of felines that are destroyed in shelters every year!

The Humane Society of the United States (and **RESQCATS**) offers these reasons for not buying kittens from a pet store...

- 1. Pet stores obtain their kittens and cats from brokers, kitten mills and backyard or "accidental" breeders. They are not carefully bred for health or temperament.
- 2. Cats in kitten mills are caged and continually bred for years, with little or no human companionship. They are killed, abandoned or sold to another "miller" after their fertility wanes.
- 3. Pet store clerks will never admit that their kittens and cats come from these mills. They focus on sales and making a profit, not the welfare of the cats.
- 4. Pet store employees typically have only limited knowledge about cats and feline care.
- 5. Do not be fooled into thinking that a "USDA-inspected" breeder means a "good" breeder. The U.S. Department of Agriculture establishes only minimum care standards.
- 6. Kitten mill kittens often have medical problems that can lead to pricey vet bills.
- 7. Pet store kittens are not handled and socialized properly and are often separated from their mother and littermates too early.

One notable exception...Please consider giving a home to cats and kittens that are showcased by local animal shelters, breed rescue clubs and other reputable rescue groups at pet stores. Some pet stores offer space to these groups in their efforts to find loving homes for the cats and kittens.
