RESQCATS finished the season with 146 adoptions for 2011 and that brings our total number of adoptions to 1886 cats and kittens since we began in 1997. It has been an amazing ride and we should all feel good about the difference we have made. Thanks to

the volunteers, adopters, vets, contributors, fosters and many others...you have all made this another successful year.

Now for some additional current news to bring you up to date.

In the last newsletter, I mentioned a kitty named "Iris," who was very sick when she arrived at RESQCATS with her eight kittens. She was in terrible health and needed a lot of extra help in order to care for her babies. She did not have enough milk to feed all of them so they were supplemental bottle fed several times daily.

Iris spent 5 months at RESQCATS suffering from intestinal issues. She underwent all kinds of tests, repeated blood work, ultrasounds, x-rays, antibiotics, special worming medications and even exploratory surgery where several biopsies were done in order to determine why her white blood cell count was so high and what was causing her diarreah. The total costs for her care was \$4000.00. I

am happy to report that she is in perfect health now and was adopted in October after breaking the record for longest stay at RESQCATS and the most expensive, too.

Two of Iris' kittens began to fail soon after her arrival and went to foster care with a volunteer, Nancy Aguirre. They both survived because of her around the clock care. Seven of Iris' kittens were adopted out as healthy little miracles. Her eighth kitten, "Rosie" was adopted by Nancy and her husband, Jesus, as a special needs kitten. She is still in the care of RESQCATS with symptoms similar to her mom'shigh white blood cell count and occasional diarreah. We are still

working with the veterinarian and internal specialist to resolve Rosie's issues.

Thank you to all of you who made a special contribution to help Iris...you made a difference and helped give her the second chance at life she so deserved. And Rosie will also have that chance because of all of you.

In the last newsletter, I also took the opportunity to talk to you about a three month old kitten named "Braveheart." His physi-

cal exam revealed an alarming heart murmur...it rated four on a scale of one to six so it was not something to be taken lightly.

Jim Hurnblad, a volunteer, and I made a trip with Braveheart in July to see a cardiologist in the Los Angeles area with the hopes that something could be done to help this little kitten. Sadly, the results of his heart ultrasound showed that he has a hole between the two ventricles (the lower chambers in the heart) and nothing could be done medically. The cardiologist suggested that he return in three months to repeat the tests and

New Direction

RESQCATS Will Be Taking a New Direction in 2012

I see a world for the animals and how it could be...it is my mission to strive to make that vision come true.

For fourteen years, I have dedicated myself to the rescue, care and adoption of stray and abandoned cats and kittens. Almost 1900 have found homes through RESQCATS. I remember when I first began and waited day and night for the phone to ring. I

thought it was amazing to find homes for 57 that first year. I never imagined that adoptions in following years would range from that first 57 to over 190 in a single season.

My job evolved over the years from taking care of cats and kittens to one of management, volunteer coordinator, adoption counselor, administrator, secretary, community relations, and more paperwork than one can imagine!

It has been a wonderful experience but not without personal sacrifice. All those tasks have taken me away from what I love to do the most... "hands on time with the kitties." In addition, my family of animals and Mr. Jeffyne have dealt with the long hours that a rescue and adoption sanctuary requires. Many days I don't see any of them unless it is 6

am in the morning when my day begins and again at bedtime. It is time for change and I am so excited to share the news with you!

. I believe it is time to embark on a new mission for RESQCATS. Moving forward in a different direction will enable me to make a difference in a much broader way in the community.

RESQCATS will no longer be a volunteer based organization dedicated to the rescue, care and adoption of stray and abandoned cats and kittens. My vision is one that enables me to make a difference for the animals with less of the everyday tasks that my current position requires.

That brings me to a new vision for RESQCATS. My thoughts about our new mission are still being refined but I would like share some developments so far.

There is a huge opportunity in Santa Barbara County to make a difference through spay and neuter programs. As a pledge to our continued effort, RESQCATS recently provided funding for 200 free spays and neuters to the public. This number is in addition to the funding of over 150 spay/neuter surgeries provided by the organization to the community in 2010.

I also recognize that community outreach and public education will be part of our new organizational objectives.

In addition, I will continue to help other rescue groups in the area by fostering litters and providing additional important services, all at the expense of RESQCATS. That will be a benefit to the other rescue groups and give me that "hands on time with the kitties" that I have greatly missed.

any cat or kitten that has entered our doors and were considered un-adoptable for any reason. They become resident cats and I am committed to their lifetime care. There have been many of those over the years. Currently, 19 kitties live at RESQCATS ranging in age from 6 months to 16 years. "Delilah," "Buddah Bear," "Honey" "Suga Bear" and "Braveheart" are special needs in that they require daily medication and monitored care for various health issues. Others such as "Endora," "Rainbeau" and "Houdini" were too shy or feral and were not adopted. And some, like Precious, were just too old and anti-social to be adopted out when they arrived.

So they stay!

There will be many more years of care that will be required for their entire lifetime. RESQCATS will care and provide whatever they need for their life on this Earth.

I hope that each of you understands that my decision to take RESQCATS in a new direction has not come easily, but I am excited as each day brings new ideas for my continued journey to help the cats and kittens. They are so important to my soul and spirit.

I hope you will join me and continue to do what you have always done through your support and contributions. We are still a non-profit 501c-3 and your donations will continue to make such a difference. I will keep you all informed as I always have about our progress in the community and our new direction.

Thank you for trusting me in this new venture and for your continued support.

Fostering - The Hardest Job You'll Ever LOVE!

There is a saying which states that in order to write well, you must write what you feel; write from your heart.

Well, this article comes from my heart and is something that I feel very passionate about. I am talking about being a foster parent.

Ever since I began fostering kittens at ResQcats, I have shed many tears. They have been both tears of sadness and tears of happiness. Those tears are a product of loss, heartbreak, success, joy and pride. And they have left many scars – painful scars that I cherish and would not give up for anything else in the world. I am proud of my scars. I am proud of the tears I have shed over loving and losing the kittens I have fostered – through unexpected death and wonderful adoptions.

I am still fairly new to the fostering life. I have fostered 5 kittens in the last year. My first was Daphne who had terrible anger issues. She lashed out at anyone who tried to be riend her – bit, scratched, hissed - she was a mean little girl. But to me, she was different. We had a connection. I took her home with me for a couple of weeks and she got better. When it was time for her to return to ResQcats it was difficult for me because I had grown attached to her - and she to me. I think we both knew that she had found her forever home, but my husband did not want any more cats, so back she went. It was then that she regressed back to her old ways and became angry again. Because of this behavior, she sat for months with everyone passing her by. People wanted to adopt her, but she made it so hard for them that in the end, they adopted a different kitten. But I loved her and knew she needed to be a part of my family, so after much begging and pleading with my husband, she came to live with us. It has been 1 ½ years, and she is now a sweet and loving girl! She still has trust issues; we actually think that she is bi-polar, but we accept her and love her for all of her amazing personality traits! When she doesn't want to be social, do not even try to say "hi" to her. When she wants love, it is the best feeling in the world! She is a challenge, but I love that about her - she makes life exciting. I would not trade Daphne for any other cat in the world!!!

The second one you may remember from past newsletters. His name was Tango and he was a very sick kitten. I fostered him for a few weeks but had a feeling in my heart that he was not going to live long. I begged both Jeffyne and my husband to allow me to adopt him: give him a home, a family and love before it was his time to go. They both agreed and Tango came to live with us. He died two weeks later on the operating table at 3 ½ months of age. I thought I would die right along with him. But those were two wonderful weeks of giving love that we were able to provide a kitten fighting for his life and I am so thankful for them. And we got so much love right back from him! If you're asking yourself the question of whether or not it was worth it - YES it was and I would do it all over again. Again and again. You see, I made a difference in Tango's life, and he made a difference in mine. His death changed my world and I knew I had to continue fostering. I have to continue to do what I can to help the sick kitties that need something extra: one-on-one special care, love and attention.

My next foster kitten was Pocket. He was a male kitten that had lost two siblings already. They came from a litter of 5 and had been born with neurological issues. They had difficulty walking and balancing. The two bigger brothers gradually they grew out of the condition, but Pocket was not doing as well. He was so tiny and could not walk. When he tried, he would topple forward as his head was bigger than the rest of his body. I taught him to walk by creating a harness out of gauze and tying it under and around his belly. I hand fed him and did basically everything I could think of to

help him thrive and live. And he did. And Pocket is now very much loved by his new family: the Ecks who have two darling children that dote on Pocket – something he totally deserves!

The last two fosters have been the most challenging. Topaz & his sister Rose were born to a litter of 8 kittens and their mom, Iris, just could not give them all they needed to grow and stay healthy. These two kittens were the runts and were heading downhill fast. We didn't expect them to live without emergency care. So I took them home with me and they stayed in my bathroom for a couple of weeks. The heater had to be on 24/7 as they were not able to keep their own body temperature up. They needed to be hand fed and given water through a syringe. When they got stronger and were able to stay internally warm on their own, they came out of the bathroom and into a large cage in the living room to get more socialized. But that didn't last long. They wanted out! They wanted to be with my other cats and wouldn't take "no" for an answer. So, pushover that I am, they were released from their confines and soon blended right in with all of us and became very, very special and loved by not only my husband and myself, but by our own cats. Let me just be honest here - they got very spoiled!

When it was time to take Topaz back to ResQcats and put him up for adoption, my heart felt as if it was being ripped from inside of me. Within 2 days, Topaz found his forever home. I felt both great joy and heart-wrenching pain. From the moment I saw his family walk into the shelter, I wanted him to go home with them. They were a purr-fect fit! And as they all left together, I felt pride in helping a family who had recently lost their beloved kitty. I also felt as if one of my limbs had been ripped from my body and would never grow back. You see, in my heart, Topaz was mine. I had brought him back from the brink of death and loved him for 8 1/2 weeks, but then I had to let someone else give him his real home. That is what is so difficult about fostering: you get attached; you fall in love. You see these little babies through the most difficult time of their lives; you become their mother and once they are all better, they go home with someone else. Other foster parents have told me that when the time with their foster kittens is completed, they go home and cry for days. But then you pull yourself together and foster again because there are always more kittens that will need you.

And Now... A Few Words From Mr. Jeffyne...

Change is inevitable.

As Jeffyne shared with you in this Newsletter, 2012 will mark a

new beginning for RESQCATS. After more than 14 years and almost 1900 adoptions, the organization will be moving in a new direction.

As she defines and refines the exact course and mission of RESQCATS for the future. I can assure you that the goals and objectives of the organization will still remain critically important to the cats and kittens in our community.



While the specific course is undecided as of this writing, discussions are

underway to determine what role the new RESQCATS will play to best help the community. But this is very clear...the organization's new direction will include community outreach and education in areas that will continue to enhance feline welfare and quality of life.

Although these are somewhat uncertain times for Jeffyne, she is also very excited about the future as she does research and begins to explore the many new ways that RESQCATS will be able to help.

Areas that she is beginning to explore include: continued assistance for low-cost spay and neuter programs; broader support for trap, neuter and return programs; greater involvement with community education; and the opportunity to assist other cat rescue groups in the area by fostering litters and providing additional important services, all at the expense of RESQCATS.

There are lots of words that describe how Jeffyne feels as she begins to undertake this journey of developing a new direction... excited, motivated, optimistic, confident, overwhelmed, passionate, hopeful, creative, soulful, inspired...and, of course, a little uncertain!

But regardless of the words used to express how she feels, there is one thing that you can be assured of... just like in the past, RESQCATS of the future will continue to make a difference in the community.

As the organization embarks on this new journey, I want to take this opportunity to sincerely thank a number of people and groups

who have made the first 14 years of RESQCATS existence possible...people who have supported Jeffyne and the organization as she rescued, cared for and adopted so many cats and kittens:

- our terrific group of volunteers who have steadfastly served the organization since 1997...there have, literally, been hundreds of individuals who did the day-to-day cleaning and socializing of the animals that were housed at the facility;
- · the wonderful foster parents who took untold litters of kittens into their homes and provided them with both nourishment and love:
- · our veterinarians and their dedicated staffs who worked so closely with Jeffyne, from establishing the initial protocol to providing on-going care to so many animals in need;
- the Santa Barbara Humane Society for providing almost 1900 low-cost spay or neuter surgeries; and,
- · our loyal and very supportive Board of Directors.
- · And last, but certainly not least, I want to take this opportunity to sincerely thank all of you, our devoted contributors, for your incredible financial support over the years. Without your donations, Jeffyne and RESQCATS would not have been able to do the stellar work they have done for the benefit of our feline friends.

These past 14 years have been a wonderful opportunity for Jeffyne to provide for the cats and kittens of the Santa Barbara area...it is now time for her to enhance the mission as RESQCATS moves on to the next important phase.

And while there is some uncertainty of exactly how RESQCATS will be benefitting the lives of our feline friends in the coming years, it is very clear that the organization will still need your financial help and support to accomplish its goals.

Foster parents have the toughest, most difficult, and wonderful job there is. It has its rare losses and its many rewards. It is a 24/7 job, many times with feedings every 2 hours and doctor appointments to go to, medicines to give, and inconveniences as well as neglect to your own home and family. But I have to very emphatically say that it is so worth it! When you bring a life back from the edge of death and make it strong - strong enough to live and thrive and grow, you have accomplished something huge. And with that, you will help either create or complete a family. Being a foster parent is not always easy, but it is always worth it!

I have to add a very important point to this article: the cats/kittens we take in at ResQcats are not the healthy, born under your bed, family cats. We get the homeless, stray and abandoned cats off of the streets who are unhealthy, semi-feral, sick, underfed, malnourished, and need our support to help them overcome all of the challenges that were forced upon them due to owners not taking proper care of them, or not spaying/neutering them, leaving them behind when they move, etc. We do everything we can to help them get healthy, social and become loving and adoptable kitties. It takes time, commitment, love, compassion and patience. But we are all willing to give that to these special creatures and many of the cats/ kittens you adopt from us have come a very long way - have won the battle was forced upon them.

I wonder what the next kitten season will bring to us fosters: challenges? Sure. Success? Absolutely! Heartbreak? Possibly. But whatever happens, we will continue on with our duties and know that no matter what happens, we will have made a difference to so many lives - big and little. And what could be better than that?

ASK AIKIN -

This great question came in from one of you wonderful ResQcats newsletter readers and as sad as I am to write against my favorite yummy food, the truth must be told...

Q - I recently heard that it is bad to give your cat or kitten tuna. Is that true??? Most of the cat foods available in stores are made with tuna or some other kind of fish.

A – What you heard is true...fish is absolutely NOT good for cats of any age.

There is no question that cats love tuna. Most of us go bonkers for it. But if you were to feed a cat a diet exclusively of tuna, you'd have one very ill and malnourished cat. Tuna has several problems:

- #1 It's very low in vitamin E which is essential to cats.
- #2 Commercially canned tuna has been know to contain trace quantities of mercury which is at safe enough levels for humans, but not cats.
- #3 A diet of tuna alone will cause Taurine deficiencies in cats. Taurine is an essential nutrient for cats.
- #4 The lack of vitamin E in the diet from feeding tuna exclusively can lead to Steatitis a painful inflammatory condition in cats, which causes muscles to atrophy, sensitivity and pain when touched, and other symptoms such as fever and poor appetite.
- #5 Fish can cause crystal formations in a cats urine which can lead to bladder infections and, eventually, to urinary stones. If that occurs in a male cat, a stone blockage can be life-threatening as their urethra is longer and more narrow that a females.

To sum it up, tuna is fine when you want to give your cat a special, rare treat. It is most important to feed your cat the food that has been commercially developed and tested to meet the nutritional requirements for their health and safety.

I hope that clears up any questions about feeding your cat fish. Although we love it more than any other



food in the world, it is just not worth it to feed us it as it will make us sick. And I know that none of you want your kitties to get sick. So, please continue to be responsible and feed us only what is the most healthiest of foods...chicken, turkey and lamb. And remember to check the order of ingredients! The meat should always be the very first ingredient on the can.

see if his heart had worsened. It seemed like a long three months in limbo to me. Finally it was time to go back to Los Angeles at the end of October for his three month check..

I have great news to report! Braveheart's heart is no worse.... that may mean that his condition is not progressive! I was elated. Again, the cardiologist suggested that he be checked again when he is about a year old and fully grown. That is in April 2012.

Braveheart has also taken months to socialize...he was semiferal when he arrived. But he has slowly progressed into a timid but great little kitty who loves to play and let the volunteers pet him since his arrival in June. Finding a home for a shy six month old kitten with a heart murmur and no guarantees that is would not get worse over time is a pretty good sign that he would not find a home. So meet, Braveheart...the newest RESQCATS resident. I have a special bond with this littly guy...I adore him and he seems to feel the same about me.

This year was full of many challenges in addition to Iris, Rosie, and Braveheart. Elaine Martin fostered "Yoda" for three long months giving him 24 hour care for the first month in an effort to save his life. He suffered severe upper respiratory issues and would have died if she had not dedicated her time and life to save him. Her experience with fostering gave him the best chance

for life any little kitten could hope for...and he made it. He is about 90% better than the day he arrived. Yoda did find a home even though his condition may be chronic and RESQCATS will be there to help him get to 100% if that is possible for him.

"Pocket" suffered from severe neurological problems. His mother was in the worst shape of any mother cat I have ever seen when she arrived with her five kittens. One little one passed to the Rainbow Bridge just one day after the little family arrived. The other four displayed balance and neurological issues, but
