I think back over all the years and you know, I really do remember so many of the cats and kittens and their stories. In fact, I will let you in on a little secret. I am working on a book about RESQCATS that will include stories about some of those special kitties who touched my heart and others who survived only by the grace of a miracle. I hope to have it finished by the end of this year, so stay tuned!

For RESQCATS, 2013 is "Sweet Sixteen!" It will be a year of special events and celebration!

Just a peek into the future...The Cat House Hotel is sponsoring a "Pedi-Paws" event every month (on the 16th, of course) and offering nail trims for just \$10. All the money from the nail trims is donated directly to RESQCATS. In February, March and April they raised \$140 just trimming nails! We are so excited about the monthly event. It is a way to truly make a difference for the cats and kittens and receive something in return. And don't forget to pick up a fleece kitty blanket while you are there...they

are hand-made by a volunteer and are only \$10.

RESQCATS is also scheduling several weekends with the Montecito Pet Shop on the Mesa to have a booth in front of the store. That is a great time for you to do your shopping and a portion of all sales on those weekends goes to RESQCATS. It is your opportunity to stock up on food, litter, and toys while making a difference for RESQCATS. Kittens will be available for adoption those days, as well. I will also be there and would love to meet you.

Now, let's get down to other business. As of the writing of this "President's Message" on April 18, 2013, we have already fostered and/or adopted over 40 cats and kittens. That is more at this time of year than in any previous years, so I am anticipating a very busy season. I am counting on your support more than ever.

RESOCATS dedicates a lot of time to rescuing kittens advertised on Craigslist. The kittens are given away or sold for what the ads call a "re-homing fee." The problems with kittens that are adopted this way are multiple. They have not received vet exams, vaccinations, fecal exams or feline leukemia tests. They may suffer from parasites that left untreated can be deadly. And most importantly, they are not spayed or neutered! Unfortunately, experience reveals that when people adopt these kittens, they do not usually follow up with any medical care. So guess what, six months from now, the kittens themselves will be pregnant at just 7-8 months old and giving birth when they are less than a year in age. I call it "kittens having kittens." RESQCATS' goal is to stop this cycle by rescuing them off such ads and providing them with the care they need. Then we adopt them to qualified responsible guardians. We don't stop there! RESQCATS takes care of the costs of spaying and neutering the moms and dads in the households so more kittens from the same homes don't show up on Craigslist in a few more months!

RESQCATS also assists owners who find

themselves with an unexpected litter of kittens. More than once, the owner of a mother cat has gotten the cat from who knows where and are told that the cat is spayed. Then, surprise! Surprise! Surprise! They get pregnant! We offer to spay the mom and only ask in return that the kittens be relinquished to us so that we can provide medical attention and spay/ neuter surgery as yet another attempt to stop the over-population problem.

In addition, RESQCATS works with other rescue groups by rescuing moms and their litters who may be euthanized because they do not fall under the shelter's definition of "adoptable!"

And when there is "room at the inn" **RESQCATS** offers our foster program to other groups who need assistance and a safe environment for kittens until they are ready for adoption.

RESQCATS is committed to humane education. Teaching children about kindness towards animals. Not just cats, but all animals. Think about how important this is. Children have the future responsibility for animals. When I leave this Earth, I want to know that I have done all I can to inform young people of the importance of rescue and treating animals compassionately.

The season is off to a busy start, I am dedicated to making the world for stray and abandoned cats and kittens a better place. It would be easy to get lost in the shear numbers of kitties out there needing to be rescued. It just makes me sad to think about it. I end each night with a look in the mirror. I say to myself, "I did the very best I could today." And I do....everyday!

Composing the "President's Message" is something I enjoy. Keeping you informed is important to me. But there is more than one purpose for this newsletter. It is intended to bring you up to date, make you laugh and cry, entertain you, educate you and ask for your support.

A Few Words from Mr. Jeffyne



Just about everyone who reads the RESQCATS Newsletter knows that in addition to rescuing, caring for and adopting out, almost 2000 cats and kittens over the years, we also have been the guardians to 22 rescued collies...(sorry, Mr. Jeffyne has badly flunked the fostering side of rescue!) As of today, we have 9 beautiful collies who share our home with the 18 unadoptable RESQCATS that have become our permanent residents.

The collies and cats, of course, are the "normal" members of our family that we always talk about. But how many of you know that there is third species of rescued animals that also share our life?

No, not guinea pigs or hamsters...nor tropical fish or horses. And certainly not a colony of trained fleas!

Our third group of animals is from the reptile family: giant African sulcata tortoises.

Now before you start rolling your eyes and questioning, "How did they get into tortoise rescue?" you've got to understand that this is not a "they" issue" — it's a "me" issue. You see, even though Jeffyne would never harm any creature (with the possible exception of fleas), her affection for animals actually stops at the reptile house...it's probably that "snake thing!"

So, how did I get started with tortoises, particularly, giant tortoises?

Well, it all began when I was a mere child! I actually moved across the country from Baltimore to Southern California when I was 11 with a box turtle in my lap. Sadly, "Myrtle the Turtle" didn't survive the trip, but it marked the beginning of my life-long love affair with our shelled friends.

Before my business career started me moving all over the country, I had amassed a collection of 14 California and Texas desert tortoises. I never bought or took any of these animals from their native habitat; they just seemed to "find" me. They'd come wandering into the yard, or friends would have one and give it to me, and several even came from hatchlings. (Now please understand, unlike the very abundant African sulcata tortoises, California desert tortoises are an endangered species, so raising a baby from a hatching to an adult tortoise was a blessing.)

When my job took me from the Arizona desert to Illinois, I knew the right thing was to re-home my shelled family to someone who could properly care for them in their native climate...so all 14 tortoises went to the "Phoenix turtle guy." It was a sad day when I gave them up, but I realized that a damp basement in suburban Chicago was no place for creatures that love the dry desert heat.

For the next 3 decades I was a tortoise-less pet rescuer. Sure there were lots of collies and cats, but no chelonians, (the scientific name for all turtles and tortoises.) Enter Jeannie Vaughn. Jeannie is the founder of Turtle Dreams, a turtle and tortoise rescue organization located right here in the Santa Barbara area.


Jeannie is the real turtle expert in the area and she is also the person responsible for introducing me and getting me hooked on African sulcata tortoises!! That was more than 12 years ago. (Jeffyne curses Jeannie whenever I travel because it's at those times that she sheds her cat woman mantle and becomes the "tortoise lady" of RESQCATS!!)

Despite the similar shape of the shell and type of scales on the California desert tortoise, the sulcata tortoise is actually a native of sub-Saharan African. But the likenesses stop there, because unlike their California cousins, the African sulcatas are not endangered, but VERY prolific breeders. In fact everything that describes a sulcata can be measured in superlatives! They are absolute eating machines consuming huge quantities of grass, weeds, rose pedals, hibiscus flowers, meadow grass and hay, as well as an occasional piece of watermelon, cantaloupe and strawberries. (At least their pure vegetarian life style agrees with Jeffyne!!)

They are also unbelievable diggers. Whether making a hole to lay her eggs or tunneling a nighttime nest, a sulcata can easily burrow over 10 feet in one day! Gophers aside, these guys can make quite a mess of the yard!

While all tortoises are very quiet...they don't bark or meow...they do have quite a mating "grunt!" And their mating routine goes on EVERY day...just

Hello friends! I'm sure you all noticed that I didn't have an article in the last newsletter. Aunt Jeffyne had so many stories to tell you about so I gave up my space to her. But I'm back now and ready to answer your feline-friendly questions.

— Help! My cat is chewing up the leaves on my indoor plants and I'm scared she will get sick or worse. Can you tell me which ones are safe for her?

A-The ASPCA website has a lot of information regarding plants that are poisonous to cats and dogs, but I will give you a <u>short list</u> of the most common indoor plants so you can make sure if you have any of them, you can put them out of the reach of your cat:

Aloe Vera, Amaryllis, Asparagus Fern, Azalea, Begonia, Bird of Paradise, many of the Ivy's, Jade, Corn Plant, Cyclamen, Daffodils, Devils Ivy, Dieffenbachia, Many of the Lillies, Mistletoe, Nephthysis, Pencil Cactus, Pointsettia, Sweetheart Ivy, Tomato

But check out the list for more...as well as phone numbers in case of an emergency with your pet.

Plant, and Yucca.

\(\text{\text{\$\alpha\$}}\) - What human foods are dangerous to my cat?

A - Good question! Never give your pets any of the following:

Chocolate, Coffee, Caffeine, Alcohol, Avocado, Macadamia Nuts, Grapes or Raisins, Yeast Dough (it can expand in the pet's digestive system and cause the stomach or intestines to rupture), Raw/Undercooked Meat, Eggs & Bones, Onions, Garlic & Chives, Milk, Salt and Xylitol (a sweetener used in many products).

Food made specifically for your pet is always the healthiest for them!

A - Here are some of the main reasons your cat may not be using their litter box:

- The box is not cleaned often enough or adequately
- There may not be enough litter boxes if you have more than one cat.
- The litter box may be too small.
- Your cat can't easily get to the litter box in time due to an undesirable location for the cat.
- The litter box has a hood or liner that makes him/her uncomfortable.
- The amount of litter in the box may be too deep or too shallow (most cats like about two inches of litter in their boxes)
- You may have recently changed to a different litter that the cat doesn't like.
- Your cat may not like the location of the litter box.
- Household stress can cause inappropriate bathroom behavior. New home? New pet?
 New baby? Change in your daily routine and schedule can upset a sensitive cat.
- Negative litter box association such as associating the litter box with pain if your kitty is suffering from Feline Interstitial Cystitis, kidney stones or a blockage. In all instances, a trip to the vet is imperative!

And finally how to fix this problem:

 Clean your cat's litter box at least twice a day rinsing it out with bleach/water or baking soda or unscented soap once a week or more.

> Try a clumping, unscented litter if you are using a scented litter that the cat may not like.

> > Remove the lid or liner on the box.

• Put the litter box in a quiet place that is convenient for the cat allowing easy escape routes if they should become frightened or feel threatened.

Look for any signs of pain or distress and if in doubt, see your veterinarian immediately.

The Truth Behind "No Kill" Shelters

Shelters that claim to be NO-

KILL should be honest! Let the

community know the definition of

no-kill has a footnote that states

I have debated with myself many times about writing on the subject of so called "No Kill" Shelters.

I receive calls daily from people looking for places to relinquish their own cats where they will adopted and not euthanized.

I think it is time for me to step out of my comfort zone, put my foot out there and educate the public. I have had enough of people being misled by shelters that claim to be no-kill when in reality they are not! I believe that these organizations and county shelters should be honest and post the disclaimer: "No Kill of **ADOPTABLE ANIMALS**."

What is their definition of "adoptable?" It states that cats and kittens must be eight weeks old, social and healthy.

Let's start with the eight weeks of age requirement. Any kittens that do not meet the eight week criteria are subject to euthanasia. It is at the discretion of each shelter to make that decision based on "resources" as to whether or not the kitten(s) will be put to death.

What do "resources" mean? Let's clarify that! Is there a foster to bottle feed newborn kittens that arrive without their mom? Is there someone that can take four week old kittens and wean them for the next four to five weeks until they are considered adoptable? Is there room for a nursing mom with newborn kittens? They require space for several weeks. Kitties that are of age and ready to be adopted could occupy those cages. Are there funds within the county system or organization

to pay for the supplies needed to bring the litter to the eight weeks of age requirement so they can be adopted? Answer "no" to any of the previous questions and the kittens are likely to be put down.

Then there is the consideration of how social a cat is. What happens to the cats that are judged (or misjudged) as unsocial? I understand that most adult feral cats can never be tamed or considered adoptable. The lucky ones are relocated to ranch or barn situations if a shelter has a relocation program. But who determines the fate of the cats that come into a shelter and are simply scared out of their wits? Some cats just need time to get used to their new environment. Sadly, some never do. Are they given time to adjust or are they evaluated too quickly and euthanized to make room for others that are more outwardly social? As for feral kittens, many of them can be socialized given time, handling and patience. They do well in homes with people who understand that the kitty may always be timid or shy. Are feral kittens given the opportunity to come around or does that take up too much time, money and space?

Healthy...what does that mean in a no-kill shelter? I realize that many cats are sick and beyond medical help and their suffering can be humanely ended. That is not what I am addressing here. The point is that many medical conditions can be addressed with positive outcomes. For example, if a litter of kittens arrives at a shelter with upper respiratory infections, the entire litter may be put down and a shelter can still call itself "nokill." In reality, upper respiratory infections can be treated with antibiotics and supplements. Most kittens respond to medication and they live perfectly normal lives afterwards. Another determining factor in such cases is that the risk of infecting an entire shelter with upper respiratory is high. Without a place to isolate sick kitties... euthanasia is their answer. Or if there are no "resources" available to treat sick kittens...immediate euthanasia!

I understand that there is an overwhelming number of animals that come into shelters every day. County facilities take in every animal and do not have the luxury of turning

people away because they are full. They fill up their cages quickly and as more animals come into the shelter they have no choice but to make room for adoptable animals by deciding the fate of others that are less fortunate due to circumstances.

That is not my point.

My position is that those shelters that claim to be NO-KILL should **be honest!** Let the community know the definition of no-kill has a footnote that states **No-Kill "of adoptable animals"**

understand that having a pet is a lifetime commitment. 99 KILL should be honest! Let community know the definition

No-Kill "of adoptable animals" and educate the public about what adoptable really

And let's not lay it all on the county shelters. Most shelters do the very best they can with what they are given to deal with by the public. What are shelters to do when people relinquish their animals so readily? Who is really to blame? Lame excuses such as: I am moving, I can no longer care for it, my girlfriend broke up with me and I don't want the cat, I had a baby, my new roommate is allergic, the cat meows too much, I got a puppy and my 9 year old cat is not adjusting, my 12 year old cat was just diagnosed with kidney disease and I cannot take care of it anymore. The list goes on and on. I have heard them all.

Those phone calls echo in my head beginning with excuses for getting rid of the cat followed by a proclamation of love and concern for it and finally, the expectation of finding a place that will not kill it. People have the attitude that it is the shelter's job to take on their cat that THEY made a lifetime commitment to. Expecting a shelter to adopt out a nine year old kitty is tough. Be prepared for the cat to sit there for months waiting for a




A special dedication in memory of "BlackJack"...

Did I mention prolific producers!

A female sulcata will lay between 12-25 eggs, 2 to 3 times a year, and if the eggs were incubated, (it's a little too cold for them to hatch on their own in Santa Barbara), about 50% of them would hatch into walnut-sized baby tortoises. So do the math... we have 5 females...12-25 eggs, 2 to 3 clutches per year...YIKES, that could be between 60-200 baby sulcatas EVERY year...talk about pet overpopulation! Is there no wonder why this tortoise is NOT endangered? In fact, you probably wonder why the world isn't over-run with these animals. Well, sadly, it is...that's why I've rescued 14, but I could easily have saved 1000!

Speaking from Mr. Jeffyne's point-of-view, (these opinions are not jointly held by the other human member of the household), while I would love to continue to rescue these beautiful creatures, they are not for everyone...unless of course your have ½ acre of land for each animal AND you plan to live to be 100...I don't have either so 14 giant tortoises is quite enough...thank you very much!!

home... if it finds one at all. Asking a shelter to care for a 12 year old cat with kidney disease is just not right. It can cost an organization hundreds and even thousands of dollars. Most organizations, especially county facilities, do not have those kinds of funds. So if a <u>true</u> no-kill place is found be prepared to make a responsible donation.

Rescue organizations have evolved to help shelters with the sheer numbers of animals turned in every day in this country. But rescues are also overflowing. And they have the option of saying "We are full and cannot take anymore."

It seems all too easy for pet owners to say, "Well, that is why shelters are there." What they are really saying is that shelters exist to finish the job and commitment they made to their animal and then short-changed! What a shame that shelters have to deal with society's irresponsibility. Believe me, there are enough strays out there to keep county shelters and rescues busy.

To put it bluntly... shelters need to be upfront about their policies and what the definition of NO-KILL really means. Secondly, it is long overdue for people to be responsible and understand that having a pet is a lifetime commitment.
